

Valentine's Day



Rather and Prefer

The words "rather" and "prefer" mean that we like one thing more than another.

Eg. "I would rather have a picnic in the park than go to a restaurant."

These words are often used with "would."


"Prefer" is often followed by to + base verb, but rather is followed by the base verb without the "to."

E.g. "I'd prefer to stay at home tonight." vs "I'd rather stay at home tonight."

Note: "would" is often shortened to "d", as seen in the examples above.

Rhetorical Questions

Rhetorical questions are questions which the speaker does not really want an answer for, and is trying to make a point with the question.

E.g. "I think Valentine's Day is too focused on buying things. Why do I need to buy something to show my girlfriend I love her?"

These questions can be a great way of emphasizing your point.
